TO EXTEND THE FILING DEADLINE FOR 1992 AND 1993 IRRIGATION EFFICIENCY APPLICATIONS, AND TO DISMISS SURCHARGES OF \$10 OR LESS

WHEREAS, the Fox Canyon Management Agency has adopted Ordinance 5.2, an ordinance to reduce groundwater extractions; and

WHEREAS, Article 6 of Ordinance 5.2, provides an annual efficiency extraction allocation alternative and a filing deadline of March 31st of the following year for filing each application; and

WHEREAS, an application for a 1993 efficiency allocation has been received after the filing deadline established by Ordinance 5.2; and

WHEREAS, the application for efficiency meets the requirement to be equal to or greater than eighty percent (80%) efficient; and

WHEREAS, surcharges without the efficiency allocation will be significant and considered to be excessive for being late in reporting; and

WHEREAS, this is the first time the severity of meeting deadlines has resulted in substantial surcharges, and others may also be late in filing an efficiency allocation and subject to surcharges; and

WHEREAS, it is not the purpose of the GMA to penalize efficient water use.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby proclaimed and ordered that the filing deadline for 1992 and 1993 efficiency applications be extended to October 1, 1994.

It is further proclaimed and ordered that any surcharge of ten dollars (\$10) or less be dismissed.

ORDINANCE 5.3 RESOLUTION 94-2 PROVIDING A ONE TIME

EXTENSION OF FILING DATE FOR EFFICIENCY ALLOCATIONS FOR

1992 AND 1993

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the attached Resolution 94-2, allowing a one time extension of filing time for requests for efficiency allocations for 1992 and 1993 provided all such delinquent requests are received prior to October 1, 1994.

DISCUSSION:

Ordinance 5.3 requires all applications to be submitted by March 31 for an efficiency allocation for the previous year. There are at least three cases where pumpers have failed to file for efficiency allocations by the specified filing date. In each case, the extraction meets the requirements for efficiency, but exceeds other allocations available. Although those who actively participate in GMA affairs have long been familiar with the requirements and consequences of untimely filing, there are many who still know very little about the GMA. For many, this is the first time the real impact of the GMA Ordinances has been felt and the alternatives that have been built into Ordinance 5.3 are not yet well understood.

Considering that the GMA is not an Agency established to charge fees, but an Agency dedicated to the preservation and management of water resources, and considering that neither of the cases at hand were wasting water, it is recommended that the GMA extend the filing deadline to allow a one time late submission of requests for efficiency provided the extraction operation was efficient and provided that any conservation credits available to late filers be voluntarily forfeited.
